SPRINGHOUSE MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS TAKE TOP THREE SPOTS AT MATHCOUNTS

Springhouse Middle School took team honors, and Springhouse students Victor Cai, Eric Zhang and Shlok Dholakia took first, second and third place honors at the 34th Annual Lehigh Valley MATHCOUNTS® competition, held on Saturday, February 10th at Nitschmann Middle School. The event is organized by the Lehigh Valley Chapter of the Pennsylvania Society of Professional Engineers. Over 240 students from 23 schools in Lehigh, Northampton, and Monroe Counties participated in the regional "Olympics of Math" to win individual and team honors.

An army of more than 40 volunteers from the engineering profession worked hard to make the event a success.

The students spent the morning taking written tests with questions like:

A four-digit perfect square integer is created by placing two positive two-digit perfect square integers next to each other. What is the four-digit square integer? (answer: 1681)

Individual scores are tabulated to determine team standing.

In the afternoon the top ten ranking individuals from the morning session took to the stage paired in a Jeopardy-style lightning-round competition to determine individual ranking. Over 500 on-lookers cheered the contestants

The top team from Springhouse Middle School, coached by Kevin Hallman, will advance to the

state competition in Harrisburg on March 23 and 24. They will be joined by the fourth and fifth place individual winners, Samit Mohapatra and Balaji Marella both from Moravian Academy.

Moravian Academy, coached by Alison Overdorf and Dani Mackavage, took second place team honors while Easton Middle School, coached by Eric and Alex Adams, placed third. Other trophy winners were Southern Lehigh, fourth place; Lower Macungie Middle School, fifth place; and Saucon Valley Middle School, sixth place.

The three top-scoring young women (Sophie Wen, Southern Lehigh Middle School; Claire

Phillips, Saucon Valley Middle School; and Alexandra Schamberger, The Swain School) will receive a course in math or science at Cedar Crest College.

Moravian College, Lafayette College, Lehigh Carbon Community College and Northampton Community College also provided top winners with scholarships for mathematics courses.

The four top state winners will move on to the 2018 National MATHCOUNTS Competition in Washington, DC on May 12 to 15. Raytheon Corporation is the title sponsor. The National Society of Professional Engineers (NSPE) in partnership with state engineering societies is the founding sponsor of the event, geared to promote math proficiency among middle school students. Nationwide, approximately 40,000 students representing more than 5,500 schools will participate in the 2018 MATHCOUNTS competition.

The venue was the Kingfish American Bistro & Wine Bar, 3833 Freemansburg Avenue, Bethlehem, PA. An excellent buffet dinner enhanced the setting.

Those of us whose remembrance of Africa is Peter McKenzie as the White Hunter of "Something of Value" will be disappointed. Neil's tours feature observation, not shooting. safari with Neil does not involve sleeping in tents or eating whatever the safari hunter shot that day. Instead, accommodations are four or fivestar with gourmet meals.

But one doesn't travel to South Africa merely to bask in luxurious accommodations or to sample fine wines. One goes to Africa to see the animals,

and Neil did not disappoint. Quoting from from Neil's website https://www.joasafaris.com "Luxury & Nature Align to Exhilarate the Senses". "Experience unforgettable sightings - hear Mesmerizing stories of the hunt and the roar and trumpet of majestic beasts on your luxury African safari adventure, where serene sunsets melt into starry nights and campfire camaraderie is paired with sublime food and five-star comforts."

Neil's firm has tours in Namibia, Botswana, South Africa, Lesotho, Swaziland, Zambia, and Zimbabwe, but his emphasis is South Africa and Kruger National Park. The Sabie River, located in the southern sector of the Park, has more lions and leopard than anywhere in the world. Also, lots of elephants and hippos. Tours (as can be seen in the photos and videos) is usually in an open-air vehicle, though an enclosed vehicle is used in potentially dangerous situations.






