From the President's Desk ...

447.650 MHz Repeater Anticipation

We finally received approval from the Amateur Radio Council of Arizona (ARCA) repeater council to install our new Yaesu System Fusion DR-1 repeater on Mt. Union. The repeater will transmit using call sign W7YRC on 447.650 MHz (-) with a PL tone of 100 Hz. Hopefully by the time that you read this, the repeater will be installed and operating. As the weather can turn quite cold and treacherous on top of Mt. Union at this time of year, the installation could be delayed until the weather gets warmer. However, Pete K6VVR, with the assistance of other club members, is working to complete the installation as soon as possible.

We have obtained an omni-directional 6 dB gain vertical antenna to install on an existing tower. Pete has everything else that he needs in his possession and has been trying out the repeater at his house with 5 watts output. The plan is to initially run the transmitter at 20 watts (medium power). The repeater can run as much as 50 watts output, but it is unknown when this power will be run.

The repeater will initially be set up to only run the FM mode. When Pete can determine that the repeater is stable and is not causing any interference to existing services in the area, he will determine a good time to turn on the C4FM digital mode. When this happens, we will notify the membership.

During our initial break-in period, my advice is to be patient and let us know of any concerns you have or problems that you encounter. I am confident that we will be able to work things out. It will be great for our club to finally have a repeater that has good coverage for nearly all of our members.



Agenda for the October 29, 2015 Board of Director's Meeting

Present at meeting: KCØTGG, KF7YZJ, KV8TD, W6TYV, N7NGM, K8FB. Meeting called to order by K8FB at 1800 MST.

Old Business:

September Treasurer's report published (balance \$8,153.11; repeater \$2,917.42). October board and general meeting minutes published. Board discussed desire to limit expenditures for the rest of the year, as much as possible, to build up the balance.

Man/Horse Race event – Jeep Posse indicated that they wanted make a donation to YARC for our help with the race. The amount is unknown at this time. Depending on the amount of the donation, a donation to ARES/RACES would be made. ARES/RACES has been very generous over the years in supporting YARC public service events, particularly with the use of the MARC van.

K8FB spoke at the Jeep Posse business meeting on October 15, 2015 relating to our view of the Man/Horse race and our partnership with the Jeep Posse. The YARC board unanimously agreed to make known to the Jeep Posse next year that we do not expect a donation.

W6TYV reported that the new Jeep Posse communications vehicle (CCV) is being set up and will have padded headphones to reduce ambient noise. Bandpass filters to be looked into to eliminate interference to both the Jeep Posse and YARC by the other when operating in the CCV. It was suggested that this setup be tested before the next joint event to ensure the problems are reduced or eliminated.

Club Station Update:

- Two October Newbie sessions 25 newbies in one, 23 newbies in the other
- Two October Open Houses 3 members at one, other scheduled for October 30
- Ordered and received a new PC to replace old one that needed mother board replacement. The board unanimously approved purchase of the PC (\$222.88) and the WebRoot antivirus program (\$19.98).
- Plan to be ready for Nov. 4th ARES/RACES exercise using RMS Express with HF Winmor and the new PC
- Club station usage From 8/5 to 9/17 (first completed sign-in sheet). Usage for this period: 22 hours and 50 minutes.

Elmer Group:

As announced in October meeting, N7CW has resigned from the Elmer Group due to demands of the ARES/RACES DEC position. Bud will still help out as able. Elmer group is now N6KZ and KG6AY, with others helping out or being considered.

Alternate Meeting Place Contingency Plan:

Possibilities: Las Fuentes, Old Armory (city owns), Marriot, PV Library. Board to investigate.

YARC Party:

Major prize discussion. Tom WN7E came up with the suggestion of FT8800R (2M/440 dual-band mobile transceiver (HRO list price of \$369.95) and Kenwood TM-D710G (2M/440 transceiver APRS/TNC GPS/EchoLink ready with built-in GPS (HRO list price of \$589.95). The board voted to only have one prize, the FT8800R, to be raffled at the banquet. Will have to go to the membership for approval for grand prizes. K8FB plans to ask for authorization at the December membership meeting.

440 MHz ARCA Repeater Application -

ARCA 440 MHz coordination rep indicated that the application had never been received by them. This despite feedback from Jeff Hanna that the first requested frequency pair had been rejected and second pair should be okay. Application was resubmitted (copy of first application sent) on 10/13/15 via

email. 440 MHz rep confirmed he received app and was working on it.

November General Meeting:

- Lloyd Halgunseth Memorial Month. Members to wear blue ARES/RACES shirt or a blue shirt. N7CW to speak about Lloyd's legacy. Public Service Ham of the Year being awarded to Pattii Halgunseth, KD7VBG.
- November election review of ballot and election process at November meeting. KCØTGG and KF7YZJ will pass out ballots at the door to licensed members.
- November Program SIG break outs. Field Day is a new SIG headed by W7BJ.
- NRA Birthday November 17. Special event station at Gunsite. CW station (led by N6KZ) at the club station. Budget authorization for food will be requested by KB7TRE at the November meeting.
- MFJ 259 Repaired The MFJ-259 Antenna Analyzer donated by K6VVR has been repaired. The analyzer can be borrowed from the Elmer Group N6KZ or KG6AY.

New Business:

Club Liability Insurance – ARRL Insurance only protects our members and officers from being sued by non-members or non-participants. Limits: \$2,000,000 per year and \$1,000,000 per occurrence, with \$10,000 per person medical expenses paid immediately (only for non-participants). Incidents to members or event participants are only covered by their own insurance. This apparently is not the message given to members in the past. Suggestion: Liability disclaimer to be signed by public service event participants. Event organizers do not normally offer insurance and Prescott Road Rally requests individual participants to sign liability waivers. K8FB to discuss further with N7CW and KD7VBG regarding member notice or liability waiver recommendation and report to the board.

Member Email List – MS Excel, CSV file posted to members-only website section.

Technician Practice Exam – November 3, 2015 at 1800 MST at the Jeep Posse Building. Prepared and led by W7BJ.

License Exam Session – November 7, 2015 at 0900 MST at the Jeep Posse building. Followed at 1030 MST by a VE refresher session led by WB7TPH.

JOTA – KB7TRE, W7BJ, and W1DGL assisted on October 16, 2015 at PMHMS. About 20 people associated with a Cub Scout den attended.

Paul Compton – W6TYV reports his email account not restored. K8FB to resend email to W6TYV.

Suggestion from a member: Signal Editor dues to be deferred during service. Board unanimously agreed to defer editor's dues in the manner other dues are deferred while the editor serves the club.

Discussion item – KV8TD suggested that next year's board consider the purchase of a small travel trailer for use as an operating position for field day and other events. Estimated cost would be in the neighborhood of \$1500.

The 2015 Field Day results have been published. W7YRC and N6KZ (GOTA station) results were 2412 points.

Equipment Loan – K8FB reported that two Kenwood VHF transceivers and the refurbished MFJ 259 antenna analyzer are available for loan to members. Details are posted on the club website.

Club Station Update

There has been a lot going on at the Jeep Posse building club station lately. Since we began logging usage at the station in August, the club has logged over 60 hours of usage of the building. We have had license practice exams, license exams, new and beginning ham sessions, operating open houses, station operations, and participation in the November 4th ARES exercise.

We now have a SignaLink USB installed and integrated with our HF transceiver to use on digital modes. We can operate most of the digital modes, including the more popular ones such as RTTY, PSK31, and JT65. We even operated HF Winmor (RMS Express) in the November 4 ARES exercise, sending and receiving simulated emergency email messages that were sent from our HF radio to HF internet gateways, mostly in California. The simulated emergency was an earthquake which cut off all internet connectivity to our area. The HF Winmor capability allows emails to be sent from local emergency personnel to people outside of our area who still have internet service.

Our new and beginning ham sessions that we hold a couple of Friday evenings each month have been a great success. In the two October sessions we had 25 and 23 newbies attend. Jo, KF7WOT did a great job instructing people how to use their Baofeng and Yaesu handhelds. Jo was assisted by her husband, Terry KG7BAM, who was a great help in assisting people with questions and issues with their handhelds. The November 13 newbie session had 17 new and beginning hams attend. We practiced using our handhelds on simplex. Relevant topics were discussed and questions were answered. Thanks to N6KZ, KG6AY, W1DGL, W7BJ, and W7PVA for supporting these sessions.

Newbie and open house sessions will be limited during December, due to the holidays. Look at the announcements on the home page and the calendar on the website for notices about upcoming sessions and operating open houses that occur on Friday evenings. Come to an operating open house and we can demonstrate some of the digital modes for you, such as RTTY, PSK31, and JT65.

W1DGL has loaded the CHIRP program on the club station PC. Next time you come by the club station, bring your programming cable and we can load your handheld (if it is compatible with the CHIRP program) with the ARES recommended VHF and UHF frequencies.

Liberia Update

The equipment we collected for donation to the Booker Washington Institute Amateur Radio Club in Kataka, Liberia is finally on its way. It should be delivered in Monrovia on roughly Dec. 6, 2015 and it will hopefully make it's way to the school by Christmas. The equipment included 2 HF transceivers, an HF vertical antenna, a 2M FM radio and accessories and tools too numerous to mention.

In addition to the equipment, we were able to obtain a \$2000 grant from the YASME Foundation for books. The ARRL gave us a 50% price reduction and we bought license manuals, handbooks, antenna books, operating manuals and other ARRL publications. These were shipped separately and should be arriving in Liberia shortly.

In the meantime, Dickson, EL2DT, taught a license class using photocopied license manuals. Approximately 20 people passed the Technician exam. They are waiting for licenses, the General class to start and the equipment to arrive - nothing happens fast in Liberia!

Thanks to everyone that donated equipment and time to this project. It takes so long to accomplish anything like this, it often seems like nothing is happening. But I am convinced we will have new hams on the air from Liberia as a result of this work.

The VooDoo Contest Group and I are going to continue to work with Dickson and Liberian Radio Amateur Association to build ham radio in Liberia - so don't be surprised when you see me coming around again with my hand out, begging for donations!


Special Event Station K7NRA, Nov. 17, 2015 — National Rifle Association 144th Birthday by John Broughton, WB9VGJ

The operation at Gunsite Academy in Paulden consisted of two stations: the usual HF phone station using the station of Gunsite's owner, Buz Mills K7GST, and a satellite station set up by Dale KL7R. There was good news and bad news for the HF phone operation this year. The noise level on 20M and 40M was horrible, making it impossible to make decent contacts. We moved to 15M early on in the operation and were kept busy for the rest of the day making contacts. We did try 20M and 40M later in the afternoon and the noise was even worse. That was unfortunate for the many hams calling us and/or waiting for us on those two bands who could not hear us on 15M and were unable to make a contact. Even with that, we had good results making 274 HF contacts.



With the 76 CW contacts from our station at the Jeep Posse building in Prescott, that gave us a grand total of 380 contacts for the event. The SSB operators for the event were Terry KB7TRE, John WB9VGJ, Pete K6VVR, and Dale KL7R on HF phone; and Dale KL7R on satellite. The CW operators were Jim N6KZ, Frank K8FB, and Loren AE7CG.

At the SSB location, we only had 10 hams and 4 non-hams attend the event. Dale's wife, Chris NL7DU, and his brother James, a non-ham, assisted Dale in the satellite operation. Unfortunately, Mike K7NRA was unable to attend due to vehicle problems. A new Heathkit! So, why am I not excited?

A couple of weeks ago I got an e-mail from Heathkit. Yes, the NEW Heathkit. you might remember that a couple of years ago, there was all this hype about a "new" Heathkit and how they were going to start designing new kits as well as revive popular old designs.

Then, nothing. They went completely quiet—until a couple of weeks ago. In an e-mail sent to their "insiders," they say:

"Dear Heathkit Insider,

'What I really hope Heathkit will produce,' a Silicon Valley colleague recently told me, 'is a new radio kit with a beautiful finish, maybe in rosewood.' Something great to enjoy building and learn from, and also visually stunning, so he could put it in his living room and keep it forever.

Today, my friend gets his wish.

They then go on to explain all of the work they've been doing in relocating Heathkit to Santa Cruz, CA, acquiring a second company, and securing all the intellectual property rights to the old Heathkit manuals and logos (meaning no more bootleg copies on the Internet). The e-mail continues:

"That's a lot, but there's more. We've designed and developed a wide range of entirely new kit products. We authored the manuals for these kits, complete with the beautiful line art you rely on, preserving and respecting our iconic historic Heathkit style. We developed many new inventions and filed patents on them.....We built the back office infrastructure, vendor and supply chain relationships, systems, procedures, operations methods, and well-thought-out corporate structure that a manufacturing company needs to support its customers, to allow us to scale instantly the day we resume major kit sales. All this effort enables us to introduce a fleet of new kits and helps ensure Heathkit can grow, prosper, and continue to bring you great new products for a very long time."

So, what's the exciting news? A new QRP transceiver? Maybe a shortwave radio? A new 100-in-1 experimenter kit for Makers?

Uh-uh. Sorry. The "exciting" news is a tuned radio frequency (TRF) AM band (yes, I said AM band) radio kit that costs \$150 (https://shop.heathkit.com/shop/product/explorer-jr-trf-am-radio-receiver-kit-black-case-gr-150-bk-16). Not only is that crazy expensive for an AM radio, it doesn't even come with a speaker. On top of that, there's no soldering. You screw all of the components to the board. I'm speechless (well, figuratively, not literally).

I'm not sure what the target market is for this product. It's certainly not amateur radio operators, who expect a lot more (in terms of both functionality and "fun") for their money. Nor is it the "Maker" folks, who want something more challenging than an AM radio. I think that if I took this to show off at the local Ann Arbor Maker group, they'd laugh me out of the place.

I really hope that they have something better up their sleeves. A strong Heathkit would be good for the Maker movement and for ham radio.

Electrical Wiring Basics

Wire Gauge

The smaller the gauge number, the heavier the wire; and the larger the gauge number, the lighter the wire. The most common sizes in automotive applications include 18, 16, 14, 12, 10 AND 8 gauge (with battery cables typically heavier in the 4, 2, 0 and 00 gauges).

Wire is typically labeled or referred to with a gauge number, followed by "AWG." These letters stand for "American Wire Gauge." Automotive wires are typically stranded as opposed to solid single strand. The thinner the wire, the higher the gauge identification number.

American Wire Gauge (AWG)	Strand Diameter	Number of Strands
22	0.030 inch	7
20	0.028 inch	7

Copper, Yes / Aluminum, No

Copper wire is favored as opposed to aluminum wire. In fact, you should avoid aluminum wire altogether. Why? First of all, copper is a better conductor than aluminum. In addition, the type of soft aluminum required to make wire tends to work-harden quickly (bend, bend, bend, break). And, the dissimilar metals will tend to react and will oxidize, which increases resistance, which can lead to poor conductivity and/or overheating of the wire. In a nutshell, using aluminum wire isn't worth the aggravation or the risk.

Note: AWG below represents minimum size – you can go heavier, but never go lighter. Example specs here do not represent all circuits currently found on production vehicles.
