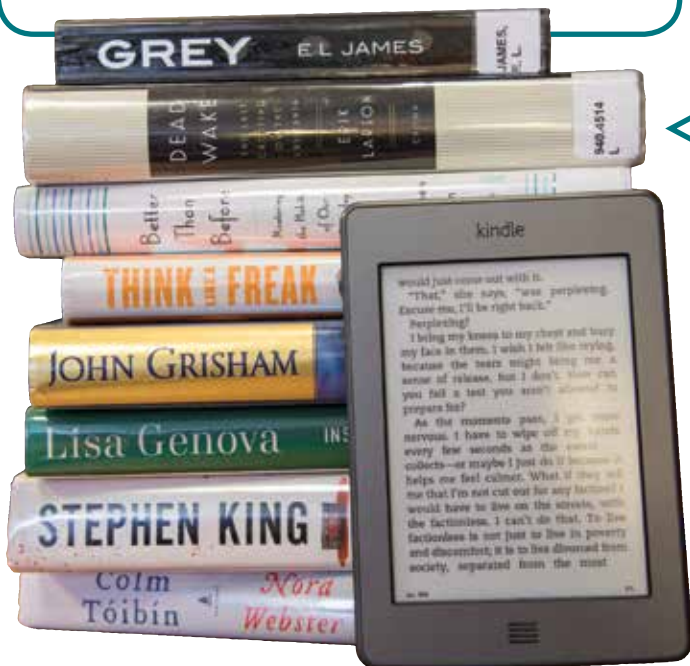


Did you know that we have about 45,000 eBooks you can check out for free? You can't actually see them in the building, but they are waiting for you to try them.
