And that has made all the difference





- Retired after 20 years of active duty
- Economy went south 2 months before I was set to retire
- Thought I was GOLD who could possibly turn me down with all of my experience?
- ► Had no real plan

BUT

- I knew people in places
- Had spoken with them about Me
- Was willing to do something I had never done before
- Was willing to be responsible for a large project
- Needed to take care of my family
- Had a support group

My Journey (Continued)

- ■Knew how to speak with senior leaders
- ■Knew where I could begin

Then

- →I began life as a Contractor (10 months)
- Transitioned into Civil Service (19+ years)
- Learned the System (Civil Service, Army Comptroller Proponency, Civilian Education System)


- Every resume has a career objective what's yours?



















Education

- Minimum required today is a Bachelor's degree
- Most of your direct competition has a Master's Degree related to the career field
- On-line universities / degrees make this option more obtainable at a reasonable cost than ever before

It is more than just college degrees – You have to learn to think Critically and Analytically

- There is **training** all around you
 - Some is specific to your career field
 - Some is leadership
 - Some is general knowledge about our "business"
- **■** GROW PEOPLE!

Once you have Education—it's yours! No one can take it from You!

Certification

- DOD FM Certification is the **standard** in our profession (NDAA 2012)
 - CPA is a generally "new" requirement, only in the last 50 years has it become a standard
 - CPA is still not required for federal service, only 24 hours of accounting
 - Do you know what you call the Med School Graduate that gets the lowest B average? Yep – Doctor!
- CDFM, CGFM, CGA, CPA, CIA, CFE any / all will do you well and they substitute for DOD FM Certification)
- Tells your boss (and their boss) and hiring officials you have made a personal commitment to excellence
- In some cases, units can refund the cost of your certification (check before you launch off and pay \$5K to go to class and take tests (there are limits!)

Family

- When it is all said and done, and you retire, what you are left with are family and friends.
- They are important
- Take care of your family
- Put them in your priority list

Spiritually

- What do I believe? Do I know why I believe that?
 - Story about the Front Porch and Dr. Robert Lengel
- → How do I practice what I believe?
- How can what I believe help me at work / at home / in my community?
- Personal Spiritual beliefs
 - Say a lot about the values we employ at work
 - They tend to drive us to excellence in all we pursue
 - They give us peace and rest and comfort

Finish with Questions to answer

Personal Fiscal Responsibility

- → How we manage our resources says a lot about who we are, what we believe and how we live
- "Live like no one else, so you can live like no one else" Dave Ramsey
- → Be a Steward of Resources rather than a Consumer
- Knów your spending habits
- Change them if needed
- Lessens stress on you / spouse / other people important to you
- Makes you more effective at work

- Talk with your mentor




Closing Thoughts

Inspired by the writing of Loren Eiseley



There's a story I would like to share with you. It was inspired by the writing of Loren Eiseley. Eiseley was a very special person because he combined the best of two cultures. He was a scientist and a poet. And from those two perspectives he wrote insightfully and beautifully about the world and our role in it.

Once upon a time, there was a wise man, much like Eiseley himself, who used to go to the ocean to do his writing. He had a habit of walking on the beach before he began his work. One day he was walking along the shore. As he looked down the beach, he saw a human figure moving like a dancer. He smiled to himself to think of someone who would dance to the day. So he began to walk faster to catch up. As he got closer, he saw that it was a young man and the young man wasn't dancing, but instead he was reaching down to the shore, picking up something and very gently throwing it into the ocean.

As he got closer, he called out, "Good morning! What are you doing?" The young man paused, looked up and replied, "Throwing starfish into the ocean."

"I guess I should have asked, "Why are you throwing starfish into the ocean?"

"The sun is up and the tide is going out. And if I don't throw them in they'll die.

"But young man, don't you realize that there are miles and miles of beach and starfish all along it. You can't possibly make a difference!"

The young man listened politely. Then bent down, picked up another starfish and threw it into the sea, past the breaking waves. "It made a difference for that one!"

His response surprised the man. He was upset. He didn't know how to reply. So instead, he turned away and walked back to the cottage to begin his writings. All day long as he wrote, the image of the young man haunted him. He tried to ignore it, but the vision persisted Finally, late in the afternoon he realized that he the scientist, he the poet, had missed out on the essential nature of the young man's actions. Because he realized that what the young man was doing was choosing not to be an observer in the universe and watch it pass by. But was choosing to be an actor in the universe and make a difference. He was embarrassed.

That night he went to bed troubled. When the morning came he awoke knowing that he had to do something. So he got up, put on his clothes, went to the beach and found the young man. And with him he spent the rest of the morning throwing starfish into the ocean.

You see, what that young man's actions represent is something that is special in each and every one of us. We have all been gifted with the ability to make a difference. And if we can, like that young man, become aware of that gift, we gain through the strength of our vision the power to shape the future.

And that is your challenge, that is my challenge. **We must each find our starfish.** And if we throw our stars wisely and well, I have no questions that the 21st century is going to be a wonderful place.
