Between You and Me

The 13th of this month will mark a year since the pandemic arrived at our doorsteps. Since then we've been shut in our homes, apart from beloved family and precious friendships, barred from the shelter of our sanctuary and the embrace of the many loving hearts that regularly filled it.

For a whole year we've been learning how to work differently, play differently, rest differently, relate differently, acquire differently, and consume differently. We've had to remake our lives, find new ways to get our needs met, take care of each other and

ourselves. We made or bought masks, learned how to Zoom, shopped online instead of in stores, entertained outdoors. When winter came and with it spikes in the virus, many of those carefully curated coping strategies no longer made any sense and we had to remake ourselves yet again.

The one constant companion on this strange trip has been uncertainty. The pandemic has forced us to become friendly with not knowing how to stay safe and alive, or how to predict with any accuracy what might be coming next. And we have learned well that plans are hopes at best, not inevitabilities. As I write this, all eyes are on the race between the vaccines and the proliferation of variants of the virus. Behind that are questions about how we build a life around COVID when it becomes something we can live with and not die from.

Many spiritual traditions - including our own - are born when someone hears the call to leave behind everything they know to embark on the arduous journey into the unknown. Our people's story begins when Abraham heeded God's call to go forth from his home to a place that God would show him. Perhaps Abraham's remarkable faith propelled him to go. Then again, maybe it's something much simpler - his willingness to trade familiarity in order to satisfy his curiosity, to venture beyond the limits of his known experience. Perhaps Abraham understood that well-worn paths actually keep us trapped and stunted from becoming all we can.

In her book *The Wisdom of Not Knowing*, Estelle Frankel writes, "Questioning opens the doors of our imagination, enabling us to consider alternatives to the status quo. Unless one is capable of imagining another possible reality, one cannot free oneself from bondage." This month we will celebrate Pesach, our people's season of liberation. It is looking very likely that at our family Seders we will ask our questions around a Zoom table a second time. On the surface, it might appear that we are exactly where we were at this time last year. However, I believe - and I think you all know in your heart of hearts - that we have journeyed long and far from that land. We are now wilderness dwellers. Naturally, we pine for the good old days, as did our forbearers. This year, a far richer question than what we miss is how are we freer now? And what reality might still be possible for us? Just asking the questions waters the seeds of our liberation. A zissen, sweet Pesach to all.

OUT-OF-THIS-WORLD PROGRAM RETURNS!! WE HOPE!!!

Lately, I've noted an increased interest in space and space exploration.

No, "Space Laser Glaser" was NOT my nickname at any time in the past, although that would've been cool if it had been.

News reports tell about the first group of private individuals (including an Israeli entrepreneur/former fighter pilot) planning to fly to the International Space Station for an eight-day stay later this year; for the tidy sum of \$55,000,000 each. Apparently it costs \$11,250 per person per day to use the life support systems (including the toilet – hey, have you seen the price of space toilet paper these days?), \$22,500 for necessary supplies (food, air, medical supplies, etc.), and \$42 per kilowatt-hour for power, totaling around \$35,000 per astronaut per day. Congregation Beth HaTephila Religious School Every Sunday, during Kehila Tephila we begin with a series of songs that end with Psalm 133, Hinei Ma Tov. Hinei Ma Tov celebrates being together and ends with the Hebrew word *Yachad*, meaning unity!

On March 9th, 2020, unknowingly, we celebrated our last service in the

sanctuary before going remote due to COVID-19. As we noshed on Ronna's famous Hamentashen, sounded our groggers and cheered on our Purim heroes, we couldn't even conceptualize what this past year would look and feel like.

Soon after we began our personal and communal journeys into what prayer and learning would consist of from our respective homes. Questions arose as to whether we would be able to feel that sense of *Yachad* on Shabbat and during our Religious School times.

There is much said about the importance of Jewish prayer and learning in a communal setting. We are taught that for many of our prayers and practices we require ten adults to be present for our Shechina or divine presence to join us. In the morning and afternoon services we even read our Tephila twice, once silently and once aloud so that those who were late or do not read would be considered and accounted for. Further evidence that much of Jewish prayer is designed for a congregation is that much of the language is expressed in the first-person plural, "us" instead of "I."



However, adapting the manner in which we worship, learn and connect with G-d has been forced to change before. As far back as the Galut, or Jewish diaspora, when the first Temple was destroyed and the Jews were exiled to Babylonia, we had lost our central prayer location. Developments ensued. Synagogues began to appear

and prayer began to replace sacrifice. Important movements to what we recognize as Judaism developed. Clearly, a fundamental disposition of our people has been to persevere with creativity.

And that is what Congregation Beth HaTephila has done. With the support and dedication, congregants have lent their knowledge, love and support to bring prayer into our homes. While not physically together, we remain united through our modern technology. Religious School has adapted so that our students still learn from their teachers and one another. We continue to come together for our routine prayer services as well as special events and learning opportunities. And, while last March we had no idea how we would proceed, we had centuries of examples of perseverance built right into our Jewish DNA. We tapped into that tradition and showed up! And once again I feel so fortunate to be a part of a community that shows up like Congregation Beth HaTephila.

LMTO Update on Faith Communities for Immigration and Community Assistance

The 17 faith communities that were involved in Sanctuary have renewed meetings after several months of a hiatus due to the pandemic. The need has not subsided and is greater than ever. Helpers have continued to assist the elderly, immigrants, the homeless and very needy in our community. Faith Communities Organizing for Sanctuary is hoping to continue its work and continue to assist the many organizations throughout the county, the country and the world through direct aid and education. Please help if you can!

BELOVED: This Asheville organization assists and provides direct aid to immigrants, the elderly, people of color and the homeless, especially through bitter winter days and nights. They are also helping families whose members have been deported or are in deportation facilities; https://belovedasheville.com.

CIMA: This is the Latinix community in our area helping people with various community needs, legal assistance and direct aid for transportation and court issues; www.cimawnc.org.

HIAS: The Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society on March, 5th-7th is holding its Shabbat around the country in various synagogues. HIAS' need is great as is the challenge to help the OTHER around the world. HIAS has been and continues to be at the border assisting asylum seekers who are in dire need and who are dying in great numbers while waiting for permission to be granted asylum in the US; www.hias.org.

La Paz Amigos: Unfortunately, deportations continue and El Refugio, the organization that assists deportees and their families, is working in conjunction with La Paz to continue to assist individuals in Stewart Detention Center in Lumpkin, GA as well as their families who have not been able to visit during this time. Many of the deportees (both men and women) here and in other detention facilities, have been granted a stay but are in need of more assistance such as sponsorship for at least 6 months until they are able to get on their feet again; www.pazamigos.org.

LMTO Update on Help for the Homeless



During these Covid times, life for our community's homeless has become even more challenging. Since early fall, 65 homeless individuals at a time have been sheltered by Homeward Bound at the Red Roof Inn in West Asheville including any women who would have formerly been part of the Room In The Inn (RITI) program which our congregation has supported for many years. To support the needs of these clients in a safe and healthy manner, volunteers have been asked to provide them with three

nutritional meals each day.

Thanks to the many generous donations to our CBHT Lotte Meyerson Tikkun Olam Fund, we have engaged Clarence Robinson of 'Cooking for Comedy', a Black-owned business here in Asheville, to prepare and deliver 65 homecooked individual meals to the Red Roof Inn clients once a month for the last 4 months. The clients have loved his cooking! continue to meet this important community need, we ask that you consider making a contribution to our fund so we can keep up this important outreach on behalf of our congregation. So many thanks to the 34 drivers of the CCC Michloach Manot baskets, the incomparable Cindy Feiler, Judy Kaplan, Stephanie Birn, and so many others for your help and support. Being able to taste Rona Krueger's special recipe hamantaschen was only possible due to Rona and Alan

and Ellen Kellam baking 880 hamentashcen in advance. Also, many thanks to the 30 cooks who rapidly volunteered for our first Meal Train in a year in February. Only a few weeks of meals were needed at the end, but your response was incredible and rapid. Amazing.

As I write this, we are still a few weeks from Purim. Cindy has over 275 baskets throughout her house and boxes upon boxes of Israeli treats and other goodies for baskets. By the time you are reading this you likely have wondered, "is peanut butter flavored chips really a thing in Israel?" It's one of the most popular snacks in Israel, actually. If your family fought over the last Bamba snack, please know that Trader Joe's has more in stock. If you hated it— it's safe for your furry friends.

If you're curious about the origin of the baskets you had delivered to your front doors on the 25th, Cindy bulk ordered Easter baskets from Dollar Tree. So, appreciate my karg (frugal) CCC co-leader! I laughed a lot when I realized we'd saved at least 50 cents a basket via this route and would be triggering a Dollar Tree supply chain anomaly with Jews taking out all of the spare Easter baskets in this region a month too early.

In the book of Proverbs, it says, "A merry heart does good like a medicine." With our CCC work, sometimes it is not very merry. Deaths. Hospice trips. Illnesses. Financial crises. It's hard to get humor from a relapse, a car accident, a botched surgery, or cancer. However, humor can be healing and incredibly protective for our souls and our resilience.

My mother-in-law, who I and Jess had the privilege of caring for for seven years before she died (paraplegia, MS, seizures, etc), loved to crack jokes at the most unlikely moments— during a diaper change, a dressing change, or after a solemn Hospice doctor pronouncement. She'd break out into a silly song or make a joke. My love of fart jokes comes from her. When I was a kid I thought they were so embarrassing and in such bad taste, but as an adult I've made sure my daughter knows the words to the National fart out loud day song. My mother-in-law loved being ill in the Catholic hospitals so she could point to a crucifix on the wall and say, "at least I'm not as bad off as that guy!"

If you missed our temple's original production of Pandemegillah, our 2021 Purim Spiel, make sure to catch a recording of it. It is not every day you get to see Paul Glaser be a Eunuch. And, for those of us super missing watching our kids shine, there are some star performances from our three Esthers— Matilda Skolnick, Sam Peshkin, and Dagny Rockoff.

We are in a time of rebirth, spring, Pesach, and creation. And so is Carolina Jews for Justice.

It is almost eight years since we started as the only Jewish progressive social justice organization in North Carolina. Our origins statewide grew out of Reverend William Barber's Moral Monday movement; Jews from across the state were there. We in the west started six months later when Reverend Barber came to Pack Square for the first Mountain Moral Mondayprogressives from across the mountains, who were concerned about legislative changes that decreased support for healthcare, public and early childhood education, food support, environmental regulations, and more. Since then, we have developed a following of over 600 Jews and supporters who want to be involved in antiracism work, expanding Medicaid, food programs for marginal communities, more open immigration policies, and voter engagement and fair districting, amongst other issues.

It is also time of rebirth for us. We are delving into assessing our culture, our openness, our caring for each other, and figuring out a structure that supports the culture and enables people to become engaged for as long or as little as they wish.

On January 31st we had our first of several general meetings this year. People were able to meet in small groups and connect. You can review all we have done this year (see report at:

https://www.carolinajewsforjustice.org/cjj_west).

We learned about Theories of Change and how to apply the teaching to creating support for statewide curriculum changes about the Wilmington Coup of 1898. (CJJ had presented a statewide program on the Coup reflecting as part of the current political moment.) Though it was an exercise in applying Theories of Change, many folks stayed in touch afterwards wanting to really take on the challenge of such a curriculum change. Stay tuned for more such learning opportunities!

We are creating a structure that enhances people working together to get to know each other and work in small groups around shared interest. Based on feedback we are focusing on three main areas: (1) racial justice led by organizations of People of Color (POC) as well as supporting minority owned businesses, and public policies that focus on equity for underserved populations. (2) Voting, Democracy Rights and Civic Engagement, which will include support for drawing fair voting districts and addressing issues of voter suppression. (3) Economic justice issues that will include expanding Medicaid, raising the minimum wage to \$15/hour, and expanding early childhood education. In addition, CJJ is committed to educating about white nationalism and the ways in which it affects us as Jews, and those of different races.

All of these areas are based on how people want to be engaged. If we have sufficient interest, we may expand work around advocating for affordable housing, for more equitable justice in the legal system; but it just requires folks who are committed to learn and advocate.




